Visit to Jerez de la Frontera 1986 Feria del Caballo de Jerez

I will long remember my five days of fantasy, colour, breathtaking beauty and grace. (my companions included of course)! The six of us, commonly known as "The Mob" all assembled in plenty of time for the plane, got our duty free and headed off to Santiago. Forty minutes stop there and on to Sevilla. Here was the first evidence of "manana" after much waiting and nashing of teeth (because the European football final was about to finish) we were given our cars, Jenny driving one, and I the other. Earlier we had decided to follow each other, but that was when it was light!.

We set off in patch dark, I promptly panicked and drove off too fast, going through two red traffic lights before a rather quiet voice beside me (belonging to Isabel Lennie) patiently advised me that the traffic lights were those things high up on what appeared to be lamp posts bent over. I christened our party of three "the long in the tooth group" and the others were christened by Isobel as the much more polite term - the Girls.

The girls lost us after about a hundred yards, mainly because of my speed, but also because they couldn't remember our number or colour. I'll let them tell their experiences getting to the hotel. We found our Hostel with not too much trouble probably because Cambell had brought a map of Jerez. We arrived around 12 midnight. Our rooms were pleasant and clean, but my room was very noisy as it looked over the front foyer, but for a short time that didn't really matter. The only catastrophe that happened in the room was when I decided to have a bath the next night and pulled out the plug and the water disappeared but came up through the floor from the drain and flooded the entire bedroom floor by several inches! Poor Tina came up and met me screeching for someone as I was in the "buff". After about an hour we had got most of it up with a very inadequate mop and bucket contraption. The senora took one look and said she had an appointment with the doctors and had to go. Enough of that -

Each morning we breakfasted in one of the nearby squares and met Linda and her busband that evening, our first full day in Spain, and I would like to thank them here for their patience and tolerance in escorting and explaining, when I'm sure they would have been happier enjoying the feria with their friends. Parking was a problem so we took taxis most of the time and a bus on the last day. I've never seen so many horses in such a short space of time.

On one day we wandered up to the Plaza de Toros to try and get our seats for the Rejoneo night but the office was closed., went round the back and saw the horses being washed down and unloaded and waiting patiently by their lorries. I'll leave this part to Campbell as he's the expert on all the names and bull breeders. The first horse I saw was a Lusitano x Quarter Horse with the most dazzling coat of pure spun gold. The condition of these horses was excellent.

We also visited the Doma Vaquara heats and finals, I was most impressed by the lightness of both horse and rider and the obedience and listening of the horse. The Doma Classica was most disappointing, no Andalusians - only ponderous German horses. We saw a little of the auction for mares at the military stud and wedecided we liked the mare which apparently fetched the highest price of the day so we had good taste! At the other military stud for colts and stallions we saw some noble heads, and some of Conquista's distant relatives.

The most outstanding show at the military stud was the driving turnouts. I've never seen such an array of splendid horses, elegant ladies and carriages and intricate braiding of manes and tails with ribbons and tassels. The combinations of pairs, tandems, unicorns and pickaxes showed the skill involved in handling so many horses in a crowded spot. Everything gleamed from hours of work. I got so carried away I jammed my camera . . . it was all so lovely I felt quite humble amidst such equine beauty.

I went to the bullfight I am ashamed to admit, which goes to show what a pull the Spanish Horse has on me - I'd vowed I'd never go. The riders skill I'll only say - most had much manual dexterity, but one man put his horse constantly in danger. I cannot comment further on a human who causes suffering nd torment to an animal even though it may be for a few minutes. The bulls condition made me feel sick. The horses were brave, agile, obedient and swift, well worth watching.

Most days we went to the horses and saw a feast of one, two, three and four year olds, mares and naughty foals all loose, and beautiful, proud stallions. We fell in love with some; completely above our price range, even some of the yearlings were going for two and three thousand! It was hot and even hotter I'm sure the temperatures reached the 90's. We frequently had to go and retire to the tent to quench our thirst, but I resented the time not looking at horses. We arrived back at the hostel each night tired and dusty.

The parade of families on horse back on Saturday and Sunday was magnificent. Fathers, sons, daughters, all shapes and sizes of horse and rider, lovely girls in their flamenco dresses. We had a ridge in one of the carriages and for a few moments were part of the parade. We drank sherry and watched the family flamenco dancing.

The crowning spectacle was the Domecq "dancing horses" show held late in the evening - we had very good seats. Unfortunately Linda had commanded us all to dress up, but I hadn't really brought anything smart to wear, on thinking about it I haven't got anything smart to wear. Anyway the show was superb, full of grace and delicate charm. The lateral movements as if a button was pressed for automatic pilot. The levade and capriole of high standard as was the long reign work. The beauty almost brought tears to my eyes.

On our last day we went to the Escalera Stud, kindly organised by Linda at the Feria. The stud was at Fuentes de Andalusia, which was founded in 1823 and specialises in Capa Castana, in 1985 the sister, Dona Maria Fernanda won the highly coveted "Best Breeding Farm" award of the Jerez Horse Fair. On the way there we had lunch in a nearby town and ate melting goat cheese, mulled wine, hot water and runny strawberries — sounds ghastly — but wasn't. We had to drive some miles in the "frying pan" of Spain before we found a tree to shelter under. The sun was very hot. We saw at least 50 mares and youngstock in the fields and older male stock after. I was impressed by several of the mares and one or two colts. I'm sure Jenny will be giving you all the names. Enamorado and Canador VI were only two I can remember. Tina decided to buy a very nice two year old bay mare, much to the envy of all.

That night it rained hard. A signal our trip was over. So back to Sevilla, a lovely city which incidentally Isabel and Campbell showed me on the way back from the Escalera Stud. Thanks for the tapas! Back to the airport and all too soon back to freezing cold windy old London, where I was met by my dog and soon off home. Thanks to Isabel and Campbell for your company and expertise.

Thanks Tina for sharing a room with an old mare.

Thanks Jenny for organising it.

Thanks Linda for guiding us and making things easy for us.

Thanks Tina C. for loaning me some much needed pesetas.

Report on the Albacete Show May 1986 Spanish Purebred Stock by Simone Willis

The judging of the Spanish Purebreds was at the very last minute taken over by Juan Llamas, after the original Judge Fernando Andrade suffered a heart attack.

Juan Llamas will be the judge at Ardingly. He likes to see well behaved and well handled stock and will send out, as happened in Albacete, any badly behaved animals.

My overall impression of Llamas judging was that he is looking for the Classical type with no throwback Arab characteristics. Juan Llamas has researched and discovered that Arab blood was introduced one and a half centuries ago. The most obvious Arab types are with large prominent nostrils and eyes, concace profile, high tail carriage and light frame.

General opinion and judges remarks were that the individual Brood mare class and 2 yr Colt classes were of the highest standards he had seen over the last 2 years. Especially the mares with 25 entries and 22 in the colt class.

The ideal action required by the judge was the spectacular high extended trot with the forelegs stepping high and reaching out on every step. Not just high stepping movement. This was only attained by a small percentage of stock. Needless to say animals with exceptional movement were placed very high if not first, even if not quite conforming to type.

Stallions were a mixed standard with no overall impression of a set type. Ingrato V (Silver medal in Jerez) did not even get in the final lineup, a pity as this horse was a good type and worthy of a placing.

Note: We are very pleased to say that Sr Fernando Andrade is now a lot better.

We promptly turned around to find the signs to Cadiz and then it was a straight road to Jerez. Once we had arrived in Jerez we didn't know where to begin looking for the Hostel. None of us spoke Spanish, but Tina (Barnett) seemed to manage very well and kept jumping out to show people the address and hopefully be directed to the Hostel. Everyone we asked seemed to send us in a different direction than the one before. As the night went on the people we seemed to ask were getting more and more drunk. We eventually found ourselves in amongst the Bordaga's and saw a gentleman walking near us. Tina hopped out and showed him the address and we could not understand the signs he was making. All of a sudden we realised the gentleman could not see. We were terribly embarrassed and apologised to him. We then decided we would ask a taxi to let us follow it to the Hostel, but it was not easy trying to make a taxi driver understand that we didn't want to go in the taxi, but just follow it. Tina managed to make him understand and we finally arrived at about 2.00 a.m. We had arrived at last!

Thursday: Linda and Joaquin drove 12 hours from Albacete and arrived very tired at about midday. While they had a rest we decided to go to the Feria for a few hours. As we decided to take taxis we found that we were again separated, as the taxis took us to different parts of the feria. Arriving at the horse show our eyes were nearly popping out at the sight of the beautiful mares. They were superb and it was a dream come true to see Doctora, Delicada and Cubana in the flesh. These are the beautiful black mares of the Escalera stud. It was so wonderful to see all the beautiful foals running around and playing together. We were especially taken with one of the colt foals, Delecado, he is by the Paco Lazo bred Stallion Ganador VI who is owned by the Escalera Stud. We were very interested to find that the beautiful black mares were by the military Stallion Jecomias.

We visited the stallion stalls and fell in love with one Stallion Ingrato, a very magnificent bay horse, bred by D. Jose Luis Escalera de la Escalera. He is owned by D. Jose Ignacio Jimenez Montequi. Ingrato looked just like the paintings you see with Royalty mounted on Andalusians centuries ago. He had a very long wavy mane and tail and was a truly classical example of the breed. His character also matched his looks. Another super stallion was the young Guadiola studs Centello. After a couple of hours we had to really drag ourselves away.

Friday: Linda and Joaquin had arranged for us to visit the military stud to attend the auction of mares. On arrival we were all given a glass of sherry. We were very kindly shown the mares for sale. The auction was held in amongst the trees and it was a truly lovely setting. We all kept very still while the bidding was going on. The little back mare that we all liked the best made the highest price. The bidding started at 100.00 pts (roughly £500) and she made 1,150.00 pts (roughly £6,000). The results of the auction are printed on another page for members interested.

After leaving the auction we went to watch the Doma Vaquera championships, which were very enjoyable. Some of the horses could really show our dressage riders a thing or two. The Doma Classica was very disappointing with no Spanish horses in it.

We then went to look at the military stallions and we were really impressed with them. After hearing so many stories back in England of how the Spanish Horse is being ruined, it was marvelous to see just how wrong these stories are. The Military purebreds were fantastic and I was especially taken with a Grey Stallion called Jeten. He had such a noble classical head and a very long wavy mane. His sire was Hacendoso IV and he was typical of the type of horse this stallion seems to sire. It was so interesting as both my filly Aguadora and Mary McBrydes filly Anisada were related to this stallion as Hacendoso IV is their Grandsire. We also saw relatives of Ultimado II and his offspring. Hacendoso IV is pure Terry bred. I was also hoping to see the stallion Nemeo who is the sire of both my filly and Mary's, but sadly he was away working at that time. The Military stallions visit the outlying villages to cover local mares and improve stock. We also saw the beautiful black and dark bay stallions pulling the military carriage. All of these bays and blacks trace back to the famous Agente. We found it so hard to drag ourselves away.

We went back to the hostel to freshen up before going out for a meal. The next day we went to see the carriages. They were magnificent. Linda and Joaquin had a lot of their friends there from Albacete and it was so nice to see the happy face of Samuel Lopez who I had met many times in Albacete. Samuel had his carriage with him with his beautiful stallion Salamero VI as the lead horse. Zalamero VI is the sire of Norma McCourts lovely filly Fedra and also new member Zoe Lindops stallion Ebanista.

In the afternoon we tried to make ourselves known to Sr Aranda, the Spanish Consuls friend Carlos Gonzalez Biaz at the marquee for Gonzalez Sherry. Carlos Gonzalez was not there at that time, but the Gonzalez family invited us into their Caseta for a glass of Sherry. There were many important people there, and it was quite an experience for us. Everyone was so polite and friendly towards us.

We then met some friends of Linda and Joaquins and met up with Samuel Lopez again. We were given more Sherry, this time Tio Pepe which was lovely and Samuel very kindly took us for a ride in his carriage while we were drinking it. It was a fabulous atmosphere to be in. The parades were so colourful and the horses were out of this world. That evening we were going to the Domecq Show, we decided we would eat at a Pizza Parlour just near to the Domecq School. The dinner was lovely, Chicken in all sorts of herbs and spices.

The Domecq show was breathtaking. The horses used were Andalusians, Lusitano's and Hispano Arabs. It was an experience we will never forget.

On the Sunday Linda and Joaquin made their way home early in the morning. We were truly grateful to Linda and Joaquin for giving up their valuable time to organise visits and introduce us to so many interesting people. They also very kindly arranged for us to visit the Escalera Stud which really was a dream come true.

Monday Morning: We went out in the morning and bought a picnic. We again planned to follow each other in the cars, but again we lost one another. We met up again further on our way. We stopped near Fuenta de Andalusia for our picnic under a tree. It was very enjoyable At 4.30 p.m. we started looking for the stud so we knew exactly where it was and that way we could arrive on time. We finally came to a rough road but still could not find the stud, until a postman came along and told us to follow him. Everyone we met was so helpful and friendly.

We found where the stud was, so went back to the village to get Campbell, Isabel and Jill. We then all went to the stud together. On arriving at the stud we were taken to the brood mare paddock. The mares and foals took your breath away. Blacks and bays are the only colours bred on the stud. Two of the 2 year olds were for sale and Tina (Barnett) fill in love with one of them JUDIA. Tina decided she would buy JUDIA which is a super boost for the breed in Britain, to have such good lines brough in. Judia's sire is the Paco Lazo bred stallion Gananador VI whose sire is Nostalgico, the lovely dark bay stallion featured on page 48 in thebeautiful Robert Vabro book Equus. All the young stock we saw were all by Ganador VI. When we left the stud we felt so honoured to have been invited there.

We decided to go back the Sevilla way and came across the beautiful place called Camona. We stopped and had coffee there and then had a walk around this historic town and rounded off a truly enjoyable day. When we got back to Jerez we decided to round off the day with another lovely meal at the Pizza Parlour.

The following day we left Jerez at 8.00 a.m. so we arrived in plenty of time to give the cars back. We stopped off at the Hypermarket to get a few things to bring back and arrived at the Airport for 10.30 a.m. We then had plenty of time to browse around and finish off our wine from the picnic the day before and reminiss together about the past six days. It was a truly enjoyable trip that I will never forget.

While the horse is the accompaniment to Seville's April feria, the horse IS the Jerez spring fair. There may be more riders, horses and carriages at the former, but the Jerezanos manage to create an equally crowded impression by travelling constantly up and down the feria's handsome main avenue, obviously pausing less often than their Sevillan counterparts at the striped casetas to cadge a copita of La Iña or San Patricio sherry.

As at the Seville fair, the mounted rejoneo fight is almost obligatory. This year's, with its six top horsemen, promised well. It was, alas, disappointing. After the first bull stung the bullring-carpenters into emergency action by demolishing part of the barrier; the corrida itself, like the slatted wooden fence, started rather to fall apart. The five Andalusian riders went 'earless', the only trophy being awarded to the young Portugese Joao Moura. The present 'in form' rejoneador, Javier Buendia, scion of a well-known Sevillan bull-breeding family, started well with his effortless, economical, ranch-riding style, but his 'kill' turned out to be the biggest fracaso — of the sort which makes non-Latin first-timers swear, "Never again!". (Honest, folks, they're not all like this. Despite the undeniable cruelties, it would be a strange bull, fresh from its four years on the pasture, that would swap its lot for the brief non-life of the battery chicken, veal calf and shackled sow which provide the diet of most British humanitarians. And the mercifully low fatality rate among rejoneo horses would make any English National Hunt season's toll seem astronomical by comparison).

Buendia's style was echoed in the <u>Doma Vaquera</u> contests held in the showring of the Army's lovely Stallion Depot —— a most interesting display of ranch-horse handiness incorporating changes of leg, pirouettes, sudden bursts and halts, etc.. It was a little sad to see so many bobbed and brush tails among these horses (almost never pure Andalusians), when tails could just as easily be tied-up. Even among the <u>rejoneadores</u>, a docked horse is nowadays a comparative rarity!

As for the <u>Doma Clasica</u> in the same ring — if the international dressage rules were not so heavily weighted against stallion-quality and Latin verve (as Domecq and his riders have already discovered to their cost) I for one would sleep through rather fewer of these exhibitions — though the blaring set-piece pop music which accompanied most performers was obviously intended, like Macbeth, to murder sleep!

For most, the REAL dressage took place, courtesy of Alvaro Domecq and his riders, in the School's beautifully-refurbished 1,450-seat riding-hall. It was a pleasure to see how much more polished, relaxed and assured the whole performance has become since my first 1974 Wembley sighting. The one (literally) jarring note was created by a small loyal-looking bay pounding its legs off between the pillars in an overlong zombie-like piaffe to the tune of 'Bolero'. How its poor heart must sink when the opening strains of Ravel's celebrated dirge strike up ! This quibble apart, the evening was a positive banquet for lovers of the caballo espanol.


A further feast, of course, was the judging of the classes, with its bevy of beauty including the mare threesomes and (British shows please copy) free-running foals. It was obviously not a vintage stallion year, and one had the occasional nagging worry that the urge to obliterate forever the despised acarnerado (sheep-shaped) profile may have resulted in some heads as characterless as they are 'correct'. More than once I found myself sighing for the sight of one of these noble old-style heads once attached to such as John Fulton's "Majestad" (vide Vavra), Domecq's bullfighting stallion "Universo", etc.. Although loath to attribute lack of intelligence to some of the shorter, straighter heads, some entires did behave in an uncharacteristic, slightly silly fashion. It was a trifle mortifying to note that , in a parade of young, mainly Andalusian stallions, the most impeccable manners were displayed by two Arabs.

Altogether, though, a marvellous trip, thoroughly enjoyed by my wife Isabel and myself — for which thanks to Jenny, Jill (and her unselfish hours behind the wheel), the Tina's and, of course, Linda and Joaquin, whose inside knowledge, contacts, and tireless and inspired shepherding ensured us plenty of what we'd all come to see — horses, horses and (for good measure) more horses!


Reg I Purebred Spanish State Registered Stock with full Spanish Papers and entered into the Spanish State Stud Books.
