

Andalusians in Britain

Those Andalusians have a nobility all their own. But when Libby Bale said those heartfelt words, it was not the people she was talking about - it was the horses.

Libby, who has been in the saddle since she was five, and owned her first horse when she was 7, changed the pivot point of her life last year when she bought her Andalusian stallion and joined the British Andalusian Horse Society.

That society of some 100 people in Britain has as its objective the breeding, training and presentation of the Andalusian horse. In this, they find they are trying to introduce something unfamiliar to the English riding community. The British ideal, says Libby, is to see a horse move with the traditional straight action. The performance of the Andalusian horse is different... less familiar. Consequently Andalusian horses are hard to show with any breed other than their own, as the movement of the Andaluz horse is very different, with high knee action and very exaggerated gaits.

Some see the performance as flambuoyant. Yet none can deny the

wonderful qualities of the Andaluz horse. The Andalusian Society hopes to get more interest every year in their activities in Britain.

Now the Society begins to breed horses in England and sell foals there. 1987 is an exciting year as seven purebred Andalusian foals are due to be born in England this year.

Libby's stallion is called Euclides, a purebred grey, purchased in Spain from Linda and Joaquin Rodriguez of the De La Villa Stud and Training Centre in Albacete. Libby has had her four-year old stallion for a year now and has found him to be one of the joys of her life. An Andalusian stallion would go for anything from 4.000 to 22.000 pounds, according to his training. Euclides still has eight or nine years to train, is still learning, and she hopes to get him to Gran Prix level. Training starts when the horse is three, when it is said to be 'backed' not yet schooled but amenable to the saddle. Training



will continue all its life. Some horses live to their mid-20s.

Libby found that when her Albacetebred horse arrived in England, her heart went out to him. He had travelled four days in a horse box to get there, and was more than happy to find himself free again - though Bedfordshire was a totally new experience. He didn't even know what grass was. He couldn't graze except with his feet far apart in the front, like a giraffe... he simply could not get his head down. It took six months before he really discovered the delights of grazing in his own pasture.

In Spain, Euclides had been brought up in a stable, with daily run in the exercise area. Now, with freedom all day long, he finds life very different. Libby says with a smile that he coped well with the cold, but did not like the wet - especially the puddles, which splashed him. For a while he was disorientated. Smells, food, all were so different for him. Many new owners worry as to how their foreign born horse will behave. One nervous Andalusian horse did go over the fence into a neighbour's greenhouse.

Now that Euclides has taken to the English environment, he has adjusted to conditions around him, too. He knows how to open the gate to his stall from inside. Libby has to padlock it to keep him in. When he is hungry, he throws the bucket out for food. But she says it is mischief, not appetite. He has many endearing tricks, none of then nasty.

It has taken the horse nearly a year to accept her as its owner, but now they have 100 % trust in each other. His favourite treat is carrots, but he has learned, too, to pick apples off the tree. His only real dislike is water. His favourite playmate is a 25" Shetland pony. They play through the fence. He has no companion in his own field, but is very well pleased in the company of other horses.

Asked what was the biggest difference between the English thoroughbred and the Andalusian purebred, Libby feels the latter are more exhilarating to ride, more interesting to handle, and they do learn "airs above the ground" as the Lipizzaners do. The Spanish horse is more classic, its manners precise, its nastiness bred out. Libby would like to see the Andaluz horses shown in England as they are shown in Spain, plaited with ribbons and bells, proud as in a Sevilla fiesta, their riders in Spanish apparel. Libby came out to Spain this



autumn to pick up her saddles, bridles, saddlecloths - all specially made out here.

But Libby knows she is prejudiced in her love of the Andaluz horse. She sold her share in a house in England to buy her horse and is now living in a country home with land and stables in which she keeps her stallion and five other horses, soon to be six, as she has recently purchased a six month old Andalusian colt called Luchador, bred in England.

Libby, whose parents live in Jesus Pobre, has been coming to the Costa Blanca since 1968, and has worked with the horses here, first at the Javea Go-Cart track, and later at the stable which used to be out by the golf club. She took her training for a Groom's Diploma at

St. Alban's in Hertfordshire and eventually took over running the livery yard (private horses plus your own). She offers these lines by Ronald Doncan as expressing her feeling for the wonderful life she has chosen - that of the horse:

He serves without servility, he has fought without enmity. There is nothing so powerful, nothing less violent. There is nothing so quick, nothing more patient. England's past has been borne on his back. All our history is his industry. We are his heirs. He is our inheritance.

ARDINGLY 1988

Our judge for Ardingly Show Mr N. Dougall has kindly given us information on how he would like to judge the Ridden Class(es):

To commence, circle the judge at walk, trot and canter, first on one rein then the other.

Then each horse to give an individual show, figure eights at the trot and canter. To perform a flying change at the canter if possible, otherwise should come back to a trot or walk and strike off again on the correct leading leg at the middle of the figure eight.

Finally, each horse ridden at an extended canter, not a gallop, on a very large circle, then coming back to the judge and halting before him, standing squarely and calm on the bit.

. The judge will be looking for a harmonious rounded outline, especially at the trot and canter, with the horse going forward proudly on the bit and under control at all times.

PLEASE NOTE: Correct dress must be worn when showing. All stewards will be informed to ask competitors unsuitably dressed to leave the ring. We must present ourselves in professional manner at all times.

The comittee have compiled a 'Handbook' for showing our horses, which I'm sure will answer any questions you may have.

NUNO OLIVEIRA'S VISIT by Christine Davies.

Reading Horse and Hound one day I was amazed and excited to read about a visit to this country by Nuno Oliveira. He has been invited to take a days instruction for the Association of British Riding Schools, at their annual conference on October 20th. The article went on to say that they were looking for six horses of different breeds to offer themselves for selection on that day.

I rang the Association immediately to find out more and to see if Ultimado may be suitable. The Chairman of the Association Mrs Harris took down details and asked if our secretary could officially nominate us. I rang Jenny and she duly did so.

It was a long wait, nearly three months to see if we had been lucky. During this time Ultimado injured his front leg, wheeling round too near the iron gate while turned out in the field. He had a bad knock on the outside of his fetlock joint. The injury threw up a splint and he was lame.

The Vet was very good and thought with lots of good nursing we might just get him sound for the visit. Ultimado was confined to his box. The letter arrived and we were officially invited. I was thrilled, Nuno Oliveira had always been an unobtainable goal as an instructor, but someone I had dreamed about having lessons with. It was now going to happen.

I had to confirm that we would indeed be available for the day and did so, but Ultimado was still not quite sound. We had six more weeks to go before D Day, I felt we could just be right by then. Starting with half an hours walking each day and gradually building up to light after 3 weeks he stayed sound, now for the real test could he stand, trot and canter? The fields were soft and he progressed well but this build up for an important day was hardly ideal.

Ultimado is an exceptional horse and inspite of the fact he had had no school work in nearly four months he was fit and well and ready to be a guinea pig. He was the first horse to perform before the Maestro. Ultimado was rather phased to suddenly being left on his own in front of hundreds of spectators and so was not his usual confident self, neither was I. Anyway, we attempted to perform a little of what we were good at but Ultimado was very tense. "Here cometh the first lesson". Nuno asked me why I had gone into trot work after only a short time in walk and before the horse had settled in at that pace (but when you are put in the position of performing for 5 minutes and showing off your horse you don't like to bore people by walking). However the point was very well made and patently obvious. Nunos pupil Lucy took over the ride on Ultimado and he soon settled down, demonstrating a good rhythm and cadence in the walk and then the trot.

His shoulder in came easily and it's value on the whole horse was explained by Nuno. This movement was like an asprin, a cure if you like for all problems.

Ultimado worked very well and I was very proud of him, he only had a little trouble, when cantering he showed lack of gymnastic preparation. Nuno had me stand by him all the time he was instructing his pupil and passed on valuable tips and comments he told me I was very fortunate to be able to ride such a lovely horse.

Lucy rode in the same manner as the Maestro. She had a wonderful secure seat, the lightest of hands and her leg position hardly moved even when riding more difficult horses.

Nuno explained the seat briefly and said that we dont listen to our horses enough through it, he went on to say that the walk was the most valuable pace in the training of the horse and not enough people get it right. The walk must be slowed down to achieve rhythm but at the same time it must contain power. It is this power that should be ready for anything that is asked for, be it trot, canter, piaffe or passage.

Lucy rode all the horses which ranged from a 4yr old eventer to John Lassetter's very advanced Swedish Stallion Big A. All the horses with out exception went better for her using the techniques taught by Nuno and she also corrected and improved every horse whatever its problem.

Words could not convey the amazing day we all had. Those of us who appreciate 'Fine Art' had a feast and I can only feel sorry for those people unfortunate enough not to attend. Each and ever horse performed well that day and he explained that yout horse should be your friend and to give to him is good. The lightest of contact on the reins gives the horse the freedom to move. The better you sit in balance with the horse the lighter can be your leg aids. But for me the most revealing comment was "listen to your horse with your seat" How many of us spend enough time doing this? It will reveal if you are in balance with your horse especially on circles and turns. How often do we feel the horse lean in or swing the quarters, the truth is it is the rider who unwittingly is not correct. Lastly the walk, spend more time perfecting this pace it gives you the and the horse more time to prepare for circles and turns and changes of direction you learn to stay in balance and feel the action of the hind legs engaging under the horse.

It was truly a memorable day.






