
Bettina Drummond Preserving A Classical Art

As an adolescent, growing up on the backs of some of the most highly trained haute ecole horses of Europe, Bettina Drummond had the unique and extraordinary experience of being exposed to the world renowned classical dressage master, Nuno Oliveira, perhaps the most revered classical horseman of our time. Master Nuno Oliveira performed all over the world, especially for European royalty; he rode at the Salon du Cheval in Paris and for cavalry officers of the Cadre Noir of Saumur, France. Reflecting the great respect of all his admirers, Mr Oliveira was addressed as Master in English, Maitre in France, Maestro in Spanish and Mestra in Portugese. Known as a genius with horses, he imparted his love of equestrian artistry to his pupil of fifteen years, Bettina Drummond. He refers to her as " a very gifted rider" in his book, Notes and Reminiscences of a Portugese Rider.

At age seven, Ms. Drummond started spending her holidays from her Parisian school, in the rustic, little town of Avessada, about twenty miles from Lisbon, at Maestro Oliveira's school. Her mother, the late Phylis Field, a patron of Maestro Oliveira's Portugese Riding School, thought it would be an excellent opportunity for her daughter to study, learn and appreciate the classical art of equitation of the legendary Maestro Oliveira.


Unfortunately, Ms. Drummond did not enjoy the experience in the beginning. She disliked the boring lessons, incessant classical arias, and rigorous demands on her. She

had no interest in demonstrating the horses to the International visitors of the school. Bettina wanted to play the piano! Her mother had to bribe her reluctant daughter with piano lessons in exchange for her pursuing studies in classical equitation with the Maestro. It was Maestro Oliveira who knowingly enticed the youngster. He suggested that she be given her mother's sidesaddle mount, the Lusitano stallion Junco, who had weak stifles and, at that point, could not be used for exhibition. Wanting to help the proud horse overcome his physical problems, the young girl put heart and soul into working with him. He became her friend and playmate. Through her time, hard

work and genuine efforts, grew a bonding, a deep relationship with the noble horse Junco. Bettina states, "I had to learn to like horses for being horses. You don't learn to ride and live through horses but with them instead. I think it's a healthier, more fun approach ... And you learn from each other that way." Recalling the coveted piano lessons, she says, "I needed the music to learn to enjoy the movement of horses, to find an expression of music through the cadencing of the horses. I think that is why Mr. Oliveira was drawn to opera too. The physical passion that horses express in movement is often reflected in music, and particularly in opera. I grew to understand that later on in life."

Ms. Drummond acknowledges the fact that in Portugal she learned to ride in a reverse fashion, the opposite way chronologically. From the start, she rode highly trained, perfectly balanced haute ecole horses. From the beginning, she knew and felt the ideal, the end result. She experienced lightness, cadence and impulsion. Ms. Drummond states, "Riding Iberian horses develops the classical seat. One of the things Mr. Oliveira used to say was, 'Follow the horse's back with your back.' The big question was, how? I think studying the airs above the ground had a great impact on my seat... being able to ride practically through anything and having the confidence of being able to hold your balance through any motion of the horse, gives you greater independence and speed of aids." Since Iberian horses are so agile and over-react so quickly, both laterally and diagonally, a good seat is crucial. With a well developed seat, the rider is able to direct, balance, re-adjust and correct the horse during a performance.

Ms. Drummond notes that Mr. Oliveira personally prepared the horses from the start and with this had complete control over the horsestudents and human-students. She explains, "In the haute ecole you are trained to be a receiving station first and foremost and then a broadcaster, when you have analysed what you have received and you have control in your seat, balance of mind, plus understanding of the horse's psychological and physical nature. In the United States, people believe that the seat must be developed over a long period of time. The thinking in Europe, however, is to develop the seat first, then you can ride." According to Maestro Oliveira, there must be technical accuracy and brilliance in classical riding. No matter how technically perfect the performance, if it lacks brilliance, it is mediocre.

At age nineteen, Ms.

Drummond was awarded her license as a trainer, the only American to earn one from the Portugese Riding School. Maestro Oliveira presented her with the gift of his bridle that

dates back to the 18th century. Mr. Oliveira had received the bridle from his teacher, Mestre Joaquim Gonzales de Miranda, the last Royal Master of the Horse to the King of Portugal.

Ms. Drummond had the honour of being invited to ride the horses at Saumur, France during the time when Colonel Pierre Durand was Ecuver en Chef of the Cadre Noir. In a transatlantic telephone interview with the now retired General Durand. he told this writer, "Ms. Drummond is a keen, very gifted, sensitive rider of the same line and on the same scale as Nuno Oliveira." And "... if Mr. Oliveira were alive today, he would be intensely proud of her." He continued to praise her by stating, "She has finesse in riding; she is always beautiful with a light, majestic manner. Other qualities are her good technique, serious attitude and passion for her craft." General Durand mentioned an important attribute, "She has the talent to teach, the ability to express herself, to show and explain what she feels." Commenting on her classical orientation, her lightness and kindness to the horse,

he added, "Ms. Drummond knows how to play with the horse, to maintain a joyful rapport."

Ms. Drummond has been criticised for her choice of mount and asked "Why ride an Andalusian..., an archaic horse of the 18th century?" Is that question not equivalent to asking why one would admire a Goya painting or enjoy a Mozart symphony? Ms. Drummond suggests that riding an Andalusian or Lusitano offers the rider the opportunity to experience "innate suppleness, balance and elasticity."

Recently, Bettina exhibited Hamid Hill Farm's Andalusian Embajador XI, a la Marialva, in the fashion of the 18th century Portugese Marguis of Marialva, the aristocrat who formalised the rules of etiquette for rejoneo or mounted bullfighting. Afterwards she commented, "What I like about the Andalusian is that the breed will not tolerate being pushed. The Andalusian was raised to be an individual participating in an art form, not raised to be coerced into slavery. One can see gratitude in the eye of the horse. When the horse is in the correct sharing frame, there is a connection which happens naturally, and the horse will do anything for

you within the capacity of his body. The Iberian horse can contribute to modern dressage with a look of lightness, expressiveness, self-carriage and equilibrium. The well-trained ones are very emotive and should be treated as willing partners, not bullied or limited."

"I especially admire the Andalusian and Lusitano stallions for their ability to perform the physically and mentally challenging exercises of haute ecole. These horses can focus on detailed exacting work and read the subtleties and nuances of their rider's aids through their bodies with a faster reaction time than any other breed I have ever ridden. I am convinced that these qualities are a direct result of the 500 years of selective breeding. Iberian horses have an innate suppleness particularly in lateral work. They show great sensitivity to the aids, natural equilibrium when engaged, power and elasticity in their toplines which allows them to immediately adjust their balance. Their gaits offer a great range of expression and lend themselves to roundness and suspension which is reflected later in the passage, piaffer and collected canter work. The harmonious and complementary relationship which develops


between this breed and their riders make them a joy to own, ride and train."

Presently Bettina is enjoying the unique experience of training three Andalusian stallions who are full brothers. "To simultaneously train three brothers with some similar physical responses such as strength in lifting power and speed in their turning radius, but with totally different mental characteristics, creates a challenge in my riding. I must adapt the fundamental aids to each horse's temperament and consider the effects produced by the individual personality traits of each."

She describes the diverse strategies she employs. "My training emphasis is trust with the oldest stallion Embajador XI (Embajador IX x Bandolera).. Embajador XI has such an innate kindness that he stresses if his body cannot quickly accommodate a new position. So he needs to trust that I will get him there on time, if he gives me enough time to think it through for him."

Commenting on the middle brother, Bettina states, "Boccanegra is a powerhouse. Standing at 16.2 hands, he is always at ready, waiting to bring on the turbo extra. This leads him to make sequences of little untidy mistakes which eventually throw him off balance which in turn lead to a display of explosive temperamental frustration. So I need to coax and flatter his ego until he is convinced that taking charge of those details leaves me terribly impressed with him!"

Bettina bred and owns the youngest brother, Guerreiro. "Guerreiro is a strong horse with a fast compact body, but was a silent child, very prone to withdrawing into his own world. I needed the year before breaking him in to teach him to play with his body language, so that we could communicate happily before trying to learn a lesson. He is such an attentive soul that he is at five often caught by surprise by his own nature as a stallion and, if he makes a bit of a statement without thinking, he is immediately worried that I won't like him anymore. So more than riding skills, I need to translate for him, since he naturally has good balance and movement but often cannot telegraph success-

fully his needs. The methodology in riding Haute Ecole is subservient to the inner ear which must be developed to listen to what each horse is saying and to interpret how he is saying it so that then, and only then. can the rider intervene with the right movement at the right moment to suggest the solution to the horse. Waiting to capture the echoes of the movement you create is the part of the art form we call equestrian tact. Iberian horses are an echo chamber which answers truthfully and faithfully if you have the patience to ask and wait for your answer. I have learnt a lot riding other breeds, but I was taught to be by riding them."

Although Bettina has spent many years riding and training horses of all breeds to perfect her craft, she chooses to return to the Iberian horses as her personal mounts and to establish her own breeding program. "It is a conscious decision: I have become a breeder by choice not chance,' comments Bettina. She experiences great pleasure in watching the babies in the pastures and especially appreciates their "exuberance, their absolute joy in motion, the incredible surges of energy, the extravagance of emotional responses." Through the foals, she sees the natural beauty of horses and the potential that can be attained through careful nurturing, development and training. Bettina

praises Mr. Oliveira's phenomenal insight with young horses. "He could walk through the fields and know the character of the babies, the emotive patterns and how to read them, just as he was expert at judging the perfect psychological moment in riding." Likewise, Bettina analyses the personalities of her foals. She recalls as a young colt her Monsieur Lalique, out of her imported Lusitano mare, Nevoa and sired by the late Andalusian stallion, Embajador IX. "Monsieur Lalique was a talker, emotional and needed to be listened to." His dam, Nevoa is of the Veiga line of Portugal, celebrated as courageous and powerful bull-fighting horses. According to Bettina, "The Veiga horses are aggressive, emotive and hard to keep under the seat. They turn quickly, focus immediately and show great self-carriage."

Bettina shares her feelings and passion for fine horses. "I think I truly became a breeder when I had the joy of seeing my first-born colt Guerreiro's expression of curiosity at my presence and then had the sadness of standing by my second colt, Monsieur Lalique, when I had to have him put to sleep. I developed the soul of a breeder when I let myself speak to my unborn foals and held my broodmare close when she was distraught at losing her foal."

"It really was necessary for me to go through this transformation in

order to return to the art of haute ecole. As much as I loved the cerebral part of what I had been taught in Portugal, so much of what had set me apart from other students n Mr. Oliveira's eyes was the intrinsic passion for the Iberian horse's sensitivity to the rider's moods, caring and control."

"To me, the understanding of the art form comes first with training and character forming, so that the rider becomes an asset, not a liability on the horse's back. Then comes the second stage of formation: the knowing of the horse. In my case, the two stages were threaded together by the connection I felt from the beginning of my formation with the Lusitano to the present stage where I am learning about the horses from the Andalusians."

Bettina's unique background, thoughts and experiences are like beautiful, silk threads woven together to create an elegant tapestry. She recalls with fondness having started as a four year old child in the British Pony Club system. As a youngster, she rode Western horses in the US and race horses and polo ponies in France.

In reminiscing about her time in Portugal, Bettina confesses, "Working with Mr. Oliveira over the years was like riding a Veiga horse. One moment he could be volatile and explosive, the next calm and serene

as a mystic. Nuno Oliveira was a purist in the craft and the last great master of the Latin School." The last time Ms. Drummond was riding in Portugal in a session with Nuno Oliveira, she was doing movements which affected the horse's balance such as piaffer pirouettes, passaging to the rear and cantering in place. Toward the end of the session, Mr. Oliveira said to her, "Oh, you're beginning to understand something, to develop a seat." Puzzled, she asked, "Well, am I stupid or not good enough? I have been riding with you for fifteen years, riding all these wonderful horses." Mr. Oliveira responded, "Well, it took me twentyfive years!" His answer was both reassuring and frightening to the self doubting student. His advice to her was, "Don't listen to anyone's criticism of your riding. Collect your thoughts; collect your horses and let the horse be the judge of what you do. When you set your foot on the ground, if your horse can turn around and face you with a grateful, soft look in his eye, and his body becomes supple and relaxed, you


know you've done it right. The horse is your ultimate judge."

Bettina's last meeting with Mr. Oliveira was a bitter sweet one. Early in the morning as the sun was rising, she went to school to bid farewell to her mentor. Nuno Oliveira was riding his horse, totally focused on the task. Somehow they both knew it would be the last time they would ever see each other. The Maestro's parting words to his long time student were, "Go home and ride, and you must let me know what you're doing with your horses." Taking her arm, he added, "It's important to me." Although they were never to meet again, Bettina Drummond then realised the most meaningful gift that she could give to her teacher beyond her dedication was the continuation of the art they both loved.

The NaStA Stallion Performance Test

General Explanatory Note The National Stallion Association (NaStA)

NaStA was formed in 1984 to replace the Ministry of Agriculture Stallion Licensing System when it was abolished by repealing parts of the 1985 Horse Breeding Act.

NaStA now sets a minimum standard of stallion vetting to which all its member societies adhere and in recent years the Association has introduced a Performance Testing system which at the moment remains voluntary for most breeds.

The Performance Test

In Europe it is a requirement that a stallion of any breed must either have been performance tested, or, in the case of a thoroughbred racehorse, have won over a certain amount on the track (in Germany, this amount is updated regularly by the Parliament, and is expressed in terms of the handicap system, as a 'GAG' number). Only stallions are required to be performance tested, but many mare owners are seeing the value of putting their mares through the test voluntarily.

The term '100 day test' indicates what happens in Europe. Usually the owner delivers his horse to an approved testing station at the age of three or four, and theoretically at least, the stallion is broken and schooled on to performance test standard by the testing station staff. The actual test itself takes place at the end of the 100 days, and the owners and the public are invited to watch.

The National Stallion Association of Great Britain (NaStA) feels that the complete European system will not find favour here at present. Firstly, it is a costly exercise; secondly, there would be endless discussion on the choice of trainer and his methods; and thirdly, British owners are used to 'doing their own thing'. Nevertheless, the performance test system has been very important to the development of the

breeding of competition horses, and must be carried out here in some form

We are convinced that the system we have adopted will be attractive to British owners, but will reproduce the standards traditionally adopted on the continent. The system has already won acclaim from European producers as having advantages over the more traditional continental test.

Who is it For?

Any stallions (or mares) registered with a stud book affiliated to the National Stallion Association. It is a matter for individual Breed Society policy as to whether the Performance Test is mandatory or merely recommended.

The Performance Test is designed to complete the process of selecting stallions, and where requested, mares. It is not appropriate for geldings.

It should be noted that we are allowing a longer time for stallions to develop, in accordance with British thinking. Where performance testing is mandatory this may create a problem where the son of an approved, but not performance tested stallion, is himself, brought forward for approval. If he is approved, this will be provisional, and conditional upon the sire being performance tested, or, in exceptional circumstances, exempted by the appropriate breed society.

Outline of the British System

The European 100 days is replaced by a period of schooling and training by the owner, or a trainer of his/her choice

A system of 'Qualifying Certificates' for each performance test phase ensures that training is progressing at a satisfactory standard

A Final Performance Test will be carried out, which will closely emulate the European one. Entry to this will be conditional upon:

(a) evidence as to Stud Book

approval ('grading') or Breed Society selection

(b) the provision of satisfactory Qualification Certificates

The results of the Performance Test will be entered upon the Stud Book entry for the stallion in question, and will be made available to anyone on request

<u>WARNING!</u> The standards adopted are high, and failure to train the horse to these standards will result in failure of the stallion or mare. It is strongly recommended, therefore, that Qualification Certificates be signed by the best qualified judges the owner can find. Failure to get a Certificate signed at the first attempt merely signifies more work!

Full veterinary examinations will be carried out as part of the Test, as indicated below.

The Performance Test System in More Detail

Owners wishing to enter their stallion for Performance Testing should notify the Performance Test Director in the Spring of the year in which the Performance Test will be undertaken.

Qualifying Certificates

Qualifying Certificates must be obtained by the owner in the various training phases:

Certificate A - work on the flat Certificate B - jumping over movable obstacles

Certificate C - jumping over fixed jumps and cross county performance

The standards required in the Qualification stage are as follows: Certificate A

The horse is expected to work in a dressage arena to a standard which would approximate to gaining about 60% of the available marks in a BHS Novice dressage test. The most important attributes are obedience, reasonable outline, bearing in mind the age of the horse, state of training, freedom of movement, temperament and willingness to

work. It is not a test of accurate riding or a competition - we are interested primarily in the ability of the horse.

Certificate B

The horse should jump correctly and freely over showjumps of all kinds to a maximum height of 1070mm (3ft 6ins) (15hh or under 3ft 0ins or 914mm, 13hh and under 2ft 9ins or 835mm). Again it is the manner of jumping we are interested in - not just that the horse gets over. Certificate C

The horse should gallop freely across country and jump fixed obstacles up to 910mm(3ft 0ins) (13hh or under 2ft 9ins or 835mm). A complete cross country ride is not necessary for the Qualification Certificate, especially as the judge should be able to see the horse jump a number of fences, and go through water. It is suggested that a section of a Novice Cross Country course should be selected, to include water, and the judge take up a suitable vantage point. Once again, the emphasis is on correctness and freedom of jumping, and the horse is the one being judged - if the rider clearly gets an approach wrong and the horse refuses this should not result in failure to sign the Certificate. In the Performance Test itself the horse should, of course, be fit to complete a 4km approx course.

In the Appendix to this booklet you will find these certificates, information on the persons who are qualified to sign them, and notes to be given to the assessors. All of these will explain in more detail the level of achievement, etc required.

The Performance Test Day (Final Days)

The Final Day(s) will be open to all those who qualify, as of right. Clearly, this will require some prior organisation and formal entry will be required by 30th June of the year of the Performance Test.

The Performance Test itself will take place on one or more days, unless by force of circumstances (inclement weather etc) NaStA decides to suspend testing, in which case it will be at the sole discretion of NaStA as to whether the Performance Test will be resumed at the

point at which it was suspended, or one or more of the phases repeated.

The test will be in eight phases:

Phase 1: The Ridden Test on the

Flat

The horse will complete a Novice BHS Dressage Test, chosen by NaStA. Marks will be awarded out of 10 according to the degree of training achieved by the horse relevant to its age and its overall qualities as a riding horse.

Phase 2: Assessor's Ridden Test

The horse will be ridden by one of the assessors. The horse will be asked to at least walk, trot and canter on either rein. At the assessor's discretion a small obstacle may be jumped. Clearly, common sense will be applied for this phase and very small and/or lightweight stallions will not be asked to carry excessive weight. A mark out of ten will be awarded.

Phase 3: Free Jumping

The horse will be free jumped over a grid of show-jumps, starting at a height of 838mm (2ft 9ins) and raised according to the apparent ability of the horse. Marks will be awarded out of 10. For horses of 15hh or under the starting height will be 762mm (2ft 6ins).

Phase 4: Showjumping

The horse will be ridden over a course of showjumps, consisting of 8-12 jumps, at least one of which must be a double, set at a maximum height of 1067mm (3ft 6ins). Marks will be awarded out of 10, according to the ability of the horse. For horses of 15hh or under the maximum height will be 914mm (3ft 0ins). For horses of 13hh or under the maximum height will be 835mm (2ft 9ins).

Phase 5: Test of Basic Paces

The horse will be ridden in the three basic paces as follows:
Walk for 100 metres at a speed of 100 metres per minute
Trot for 100 metres at a speed of 200 metres per minute
Canter for 100 metres at a speed of 420 metres per minute
These speeds are a guideline only.
Clearly smaller horses will not be expected to cover the ground at the

same speed as the larger ones.

Marks will be awarded out of 10 for each pace.

Phase 6: Cross Country Test

The horse will be ridden on a cross country course consisting of at least 10 fixed obstacles, including water, if possible, over a distance of up to 4km. The maximum height of jump will be 914mm (3ft 0ins). For horses 13hh and under the maximum height will be 835mm (2ft 9ins). Each horse should achieve an average speed of 450 metres per minute. For horses 13hh and under a speed allowance will be made.

A 'time allowed' calculated by the Assessors before the Performance Test begins will be issued if appropriate.

Marks will be awarded out of 10 according to the way in which the horse canters across country, approaches and negotiates the obstacles.

Phase 7: Gallop

Immediately on completion of the Cross Country Phase the horse will be galloped over a flat course of up to 1000 metres. The time taken will be noted. In addition, a section of the gallop course of length 100 metres will be marked out by flags or poles and the number of gallop strides counted between them. Marks will be awarded out of 10.

Phase 8: Veterinary Examination

Immediately after the Gallop Phase, a Veterinary Surgeon will check the horse's pulse and respiration rate, and its recovery rate to normal values. A further soundness check will be made approximately 1 hour after completion of Phase 8.

Any horse rejected by the Veterinary Surgeon on the grounds outlined in the NaStA veterinary guidelines or on the grounds of any other hereditary condition will be failed from the whole Performance Test, but this will be subject to the right of appeal to NaStA, on production of alternative veterinary evidence.

Impression Marks

In addition to the marks awarded in the performance phases, assessors will also award marks out of 10 for: Character - the horse itself Temperament - how the horse relates

Overall impression of a performance horse

Calculation of Final Marks

All the marks will be brought together and weighted as follows, in order to calculate the Final Marks total:

Age Adjustment

The following age adjustments will be made to the Final Marks total to produce the overall Performance Index:

<u>Total</u> 200

Horses 4 years old or less

- no correction

Horses over 4 and under 8 years old

- 5% reduction on Final Marks

Horses 8 years old and over

- 10% reduction on Final Marks

Performance Class

After the calculations detailed above. the horse will be placed in a Performance Class as follows:

<u>Index</u> Class Performance (Final Marks with Age Adjustment if appropriate)

1	Elite	140 & above
1		120 - 139
2		100 -119
3		70 - 99 marks

Failure

A horse is considered to have failed if it achieves a Performance Index of less than 70. If a horse achieves 4 or less averaged marks out of 10 on more than one phase before weighting then it will be deemed to have failed the Performance Test.

Notification of Training

When you start training your stallion, to prepare for Qualification Certificates, you should inform the NaStA Performance Test Director that you are beginning preparation, supplying full details of your stallion, his breeding, grading details and the name and address of a trainer or other person who you would wish to be contacted about arrangements. This notification should be made in the spring.

Assessors

The identity and number of Assessors will be decided by the NaStA Committee. Where more than one Assessor is present, marks will be awarded by consensus or an average will be calculated. Qualification Assessors must meet the criteria shown on the respective Qualification Certificate. The BHS Training Department holds a list of BHSIs who have undergone Performance Test Assessor training.

Value of Marks

The marks awarded will have the following meanings, which may be used as a description of the performance of the horse in the respective phase:

10 = Excellent

9 = Very Good

8 = Good

7 = Fairly Good

6 = Satisfactory

= Sufficient

4 = Unsatisfactory

3 = Quite Poor

2 = Poor

1 = Very Poor or not performed

New BAPSH Bursaries For PRE Stallions & Mares Successfully Completeing the NaStA Performance Test

The Association is, initially, offering to Reimburse the Performance Test Entry Fees for four Purebred Spanish Horses each year. Horses must be registered with BAPSH, be owned by a member, and be Approved for Reproduction. Horses which pass the Performance Test receive National recognition of their outstanding qualities and much increased demand at stud.

NB. It is essential to realise that failure in the NaStA Test will mean that your stallion can no longer be used at stud. Therefore careful thought should be given to the preparation in fitness and training of any horse before entering the test.


Spanish Horses In New Zealand

On my recent trip home, I decided to get in touch with a fellow society member, Linda Laison and thanks to her help I was able to meet Spanish horse owners, admire their horses and visit a national breed show.

Most of the horses can trace their ancestry to horses imported to Australia, the first of which arrived about thirty years ago, appearing in a show "El Caballo Blanco" based in Western Australia. From then their popularity grew and there is now a thriving breed society in Australia and many have been imported into New Zealand, where there are now two breed societies (due to internal problems) in a country a little larger than the UK, but with less than four million people.

I also met Ramon Guerrero, a Spaniard who trained at the Jerez




Above: Catherino II, PRE stallion

school and later went to Australia to train and work with the "El Caballo Blanco" show. Some of you may have his book "Approaching Freedom". He is now based in NZ, schooling horses and training riders all over Australasia.

I had previously thought it was difficult in the UK obtaining correct traditional Spanish information, however having seen how little there is in NZ, we are lucky to have access to many more sources. People have to make up their own costumes, using pictures as a guide; there are virtually no sources of traditional tack unless you are fortunate enough to know someone going to Spain and very few publications/videos available, although you can import some from America.

I saw many nice horses, but for me the big surprise was the popularity of the partbred, nearly all thoroughbred crosses, they are very popular and sort after for eventing and showjumping. Eventing is the horse sport in NZ, there is more interest now in dressage, but many people are surprised if you say you like dressage. At the national breed show I attended for both pure and partbred, there were straight showing classes, in hand and ridden; several jumping classes and just one class for youngstock most suitable for dressage, but no actual ridden tests. Quite a surprise, since our breed has such a talent for dressage.

At present there is no grading system, although there does seem to be some interest in the idea. My personal feeling was that sub consciously a few people were tending to breed towards a thoroughbred ideal rather than Spanish. If a grading system was in place I think it would help to keep the purebred gene pool strong to continue to be able to produce excellent partbreds; without a

grading system it is possible that over the years the quality of the purebreds will deteriorate, so not passing the same quality.






